

"Merry Christmas and a Happy New year" To all members of the Levasseur Association of America during this period of festivity. At this time of the year many of us may be wondering how Christmas was celebrated during the time of our forefathers, especially at the time of Denis-Joseph who settled in Trois Rivières in the early 1700 and whose life is highlighted in this issue of the newsletter. The author, Télésphore St.Pierre, in his book "Histoire des Canadiens du Michigan et du comté d'Essex en Ontario" (The history of Canadians from Michigan in the Essex township of Ontario) offers a short passage on how Christmas was celebrated in the Great Lakes area of New France in 1675. Amongst the first settlers and missionaries, Christmas was primarily a spiritual event. Here is how Father Nouvel celebrated Christmas in a flamboyant fashion.

"Having built a small manger next to the alter" he said "As of midnight all our Christians came and throughout the day they sang hymns that resonated in the nearby forest in honor of the new born baby Jesus. It was a joy for us to witness, during the midnight mass and during day masses, the Savages recognizing the infant child Jesus in this country where the devil had reigned for such a long time"

This tradition has perpetuated itself during the centuries and certain aspects still persist today. For many of us, this day will be a reminder of the birth of Jesus to which we may add a mass, a réveillon with turkey and tourtière and maybe a Christmas log cake or some plum pudding and great family gatherings.

Denis-Joseph was the first Levasseur to settle at Trois-Rivières. In the Levasseur of America's database, there are currently more than 10,000 descendants listed who live in Canada and in the United States. I would like to have published his biography in 2012, the year of his 300th birth anniversary: that will be for later. For now here is an overview of his early years in Trois-Rivières.

DENIS-JOSEPH LEVASSEUR (1712-1792)

An overview of his early years in Trois-Rivières

The joy of being together minimizes the sorrow associated with the approaching departure date for another location. **François-Ignace Levasseur**, 28 years old, priest for the past two years, arrived from *Lotbinière*, where he was parish priest from 1735 to 1736. He was already preparing to leave, having been recently appointed parish priest of *Champlain* and serving *Cap-de-la-Madeleine*. **Denis-Joseph**, 24 years old, carpenter as his father, Pierre II, and his grandfather, Pierre I, dreamed of settling in Trois-Rivières, near Champlain: only the River [Saint-Maurice] separated Trois Rivières from Cap-de-la-Madeleine; He was not going to miss the opportunity that he was being offered to accompany his brother who was also about to settle in Champlain.

THE MEETING IN THE UPPER TOWN OF QUEBEC

One can easily imagine the family gathering that would ensue. **Anne Ménage**, their mother, widow for more than five years, was very happy to gather all family members who lived in the region of Québec. One could hear the pleasant voices of **Pierre-Noël**, the sculptor and his wife, Agnès Lajoue, **François dit Chaverlange** also a carpenter, and his wife Madeleine Legris. There was also the voice of **François dit Borgia**, the carter, and his wife, Hélène Moreau. **Marie-Anne** was also there with her husband, Philippe Hamel. They came to join their mother and the two youngest of the family, **Jean-Baptiste** and **François-Didace**. All were there to celebrate the departure of François-Ignace and Denis-Joseph.

After a wonderful meal, like those celebrated during the year for important feasts, the conversation continued, everyone had their suggestions to make to François-Ignace and Denis-Joseph. Before the guest departed, Borgia offered to examine Ignace's cart to


ensure that it was in good condition. new location. On Sunday morning, Others helped Denis-Joseph to carry his tools and personal belongings in his wagon. Anne had prepared food for the journey and their arrival at destination. Departure was scheduled early in the morning in order to be in Deschambault for the first night.

The Chemin du Roy from Quebec to Trois-Rivières was recently open: it was now possible to go to Trois-Rivières in two days. It was the end of October 1736: Denis-Joseph and François-Ignace took the Champlain road and the journey went according to plan. On Saturday night, they arrived at the rectory of Champlain where they to settled in François-Ignace's François-Ignace celebrated mass for the first time in his new parish where he received a warm welcome. They then took the direction of Cap-de-la-Madeleine. When they arrived at their destination, Denis-Joseph boarded the ferry that would lead him to Trois-Rivières, while François-Ignace went to the parish church, now the sanctuary Notre-Dame-du-Cap.

ARRIVAL AT TROIS-RIVIÈRES (1736)

What was Trois-Rivières like in 1736? Denis-Joseph left the largest city in the New France with its 4,000 inhabitants for a town with 400 people. In the previous

century, Trois-Rivières was the most important fur trading post in New-France that traded with the Indians, Champlain had sent several interpreters who spoke the languages of the natives, including the famous François Marguerie and Jacques Hertel, Marie Marguerie's first husband. Under the French regime, there were three Governments in the St. Lawrence River valley, Québec, Trois-Rivières and Montréal: each of these cities had representatives of the King, a Governor, and offered administrative and military services.




A view of the city of Trois-Rivières in the early 18th^e century

This view of Trois-Rivières in 1709 is a drawing by Jean-Baptiste de Couagne: an insert that appears on the map known as the map of Sir Gédéon de Catalogne.

One can see the first stockade from the river side. As early as 1650, Pierre Boucher, Governor of Trois-Rivières, had the town fortified to protect its habitants against attacks by the Iroquois: the city was thus surrounded by a stockade until 1752. When Denis-Joseph Levasseur arrived at Trois-Rivières, that is how he saw the city. The houses, on the extreme left, along the River, show that the population had begun to settle outside the Stockade.

Can easily identify:

- 1. The parish church (1682: the 4th Church, built in wood);
- 2. The Chapel and convent of the Récollets (1693);
- The monastery of the Ursulines (1699). 3.



This plan of the "town of Trois-Rivières' is taken from the map of the «Government of Trois-Rivières», drawn in 1709 by Jean-Baptiste Coüagne. The Government of Trois-Rivières was responsible for the territory that stretched, on the banks of the St. Lawrence, from the beginning of Lake Saint-Pierre up to Sainte-Anne-de-la-Pérade.

• The village of Trois-Rivières, surrounded by the stockade, stood along the St. Lawrence River, near the mouth of the Saint-Maurice River. It stretched about 850 feet (259 m), along the River (1.3 cm on the map) and encompassed the majority of the city's population.

• The fields: this part of the city was granted land to the northeast and northwest of the stockade, along the Saint-Maurice River.

• The suburb: this part of the city was land granted at a later date at the southwest, along the St. Lawrence River for about 2.5 miles (4 km).

• Between the suburbs and the town, there was The Lower Town, that began to develop along the river, close to the town, to the southwest, about 945 feet (288 m). There was also The Commune, further to the West, where the citizens brought their animals to graze: this area extended along the River for about 0.6 mile (1 km).

When he arrived in Trois-Rivières, Denis-Joseph went to visit Pierre Lefebvre, master butcher, who had a house on Platon street, located at the south-eastern end of what is now the Des Forges street, near the port. Pierre Lefebvre, aged 70, had recently married Marie-Louise Daniau, who was only 40 years old. Being childless, they warmly welcomed Denis-Joseph and his family as if he was their own son. They agreed to house him and his family as long as he did some carpentry work in return. They also introduced him to the workings of the city and presented him to their customers and citizens thus giving him the opportunity to work as a carpenter and begin making money.

The acquisition of a first location in Trois-Rivières (1737)

The following year, Pierre Lefebvre had begun to plan for the latter part of his life. He thought of donating part of his land and buildings to his nephew and selling some land to Denis-Joseph. After discussing the matter with them, he summoned notary Pressé on August 10, 1737. Pierre and his wife Marie-Louise then donated to their nephew, Louis Lefebvre Bélisle: land in the suburb of Trois-Rivières in return for a life annuity and various commitments. Then, they sold a parcel of land to Denis-Joseph in the Commune of Trois-Rivières. This sale was made at a modest price payable "in carpentry work."

The Commune of Trois-Rivières was a very special seignory, granted by the Governor of Montmagny in 1648, to all habitants of Trois-Rivières, to be used as a pasture for their livestock. Following an expansion in 1650, it constituted 17 acres of frontage on the St. Lawrence River with 25 acres in depth. It extended from the Lower town of Trois-Rivières, over 1 kilometer in length (3,280 feet) along the St. Lawrence River. That location today would begin on Saint-Georges street and extend towards the suburbs up to the

«boulevard de la Commune», near the sister, an interpreter, and the first wife of Park Pie-XII. Jacques Hertel-, lived and died in Trois-

From 1724 to 1736, the citizens of the city of Trois-Rivières granted ten sites near the town's entrance that was mostly sandy land and therefore of limited use for the animals to graze on. Denis-Joseph's first location was on a street perpendicular to the river and linking the current Du Fleuve and Notre-Dame-Centre streets: The surveyor Jean-Baptiste Jutras called it «Saint-Joseph street». This street, which no longer exists, corresponds roughly to the current Fosse street; but it extended further towards the River: Denis-Joseph's lot became eventually part of the lands that constitute the port of Trois-Rivières.

As this site was a gardening plot without buildings when Denis-Joseph acquired it on August 10, 1737, it is believed that he hurried to build a home before winter, since he planned to marry the following year.


MARRIAGE (1738)

Tuesday, February 4, 1738, Denis-Joseph married Charlotte Couturier in Saint-François-du-Lac. The latter was the daughter of Pierre Couturier and Gertrude Maugras. His grandfather on the paternal side, Gilles Couturier dit Labonté, had been soldier in the Regiment of Carignan, before becoming a shoemaker at Sorel.

Meeting of Denis-Joseph and

Charlotte

Denis-Joseph's family, like that of Charlotte knew many settlers in Trois-Rivières. **Pierre Couturier** lived in Saint-François-du-Lac and his father, Gilles Couturier, lived in Sorel, but his wife, **Gertrude Maugras, had roots in Trois-Rivières**. Her grandparents, Quentin Moral and Marie Marguerie, François's sister, an interpreter, and the first wife of Jacques Hertel-, lived and died in Trois-Rivières. His father and mother, Jacques Maugras and Marie-Jeanne Moral, also lived in Trois-Rivières and left descendants in the region. It is therefore believed that Gertrude Maugras sometimes visited relatives and friends in Trois-Rivières and that during one of those visit, someone introduced Charlotte to Denis-Joseph. In 1737, Charlotte was 27 years old and Denis-Joseph was 25.



This map shows where Trois-Rivières is located in relation to Saint-François-du-Lac. Trois-Rivières is northeast of Lake Saint-Pierre and Saint-François-du-Lac, south-west of the Lake: the two locations were under the jurisdiction of the Government of Trois-Rivières. At the northeast end of the map, one can see the parish of Champlain, where François-Ignace Levasseur, Denis-Joseph's brother, was the parish priest.

The marriage contract in Saint-

François-du-Lac

On the morning of February 4, 1738, Hyacinthe-Olivier Pressé, notary, of Trois-Rivières was in Saint-François-du-Lac, at the home of Pierre Couturier and Gertrude Maugras, for the official signing of the marriage contract between Denis-Joseph Levasseur and Charlotte Couturier. The village of Saint-Françoisdu-Lac is located southwest of Trois-Rivières on the Saint-François River. It is less than 10 kilometers from the mouth of the river and the southern end of Lake Saint-Pierre. From Trois-Rivières, by the Chemin du Roy on the north shore, crossing the river by sleigh on the ice facing the «Iles de Sorel», takes a good day to get there. It is not surprising that there were few of the Levasseur family from Québec who were able to attend. Pierre Levasseur II, Denis-Joseph's father, had passed away in 1731. His wife, Anne Ménage, aged 61 who had not been well, died shortly after the marriage, on March 28, 1738. According to the notary Pressé, among the Levasseur present for the marriage, there were, François-Ignace, the parish priest of Champlain and Jean-Baptiste, Denis-Joseph's younger brother. It is quite possible that Jean-Baptist, who had left Quebec early Friday, January 31, stopped at Champlain, on the evening of Saturday 1 st February to be with his brother François-Ignace the parish priest. The next day, after Sunday mass, they could easily get to Trois-Rivières and join Denis-Joseph and the notary Pressé. Depending on the temperature, they could choose to leave for Saint-Françoisdu-Lac, that Sunday afternoon or early Monday morning.

For its part, the Couturier family was heavily surrounded by parents and friends. The notary Pressé lists about 30 people gathered in the home of Pierre Couturier for the signing of the marriage contract, on this Tuesday, February 4, 1738. There was, for example, Sir Claude Pinard, Captain of the militia of the lordship, Father Joseph Aubry, s.j., serving the Indian mission and a friend of Denis-Joseph, also Jean-Baptiste Crevier, Lord of the channels, and the parish priest, Jean-Baptiste Dugas, who was a good friend of the Couturier family, since he had christened most of Charlotte's brothers and sisters and presided over their weddings since 1715. He continued to do so until 1750.

The celebration of marriage in

Saint-François-du-Lac

The wedding was celebrated on the same day in the parish church, Saint-Françoisde-Sales. The father Luc [Hendrix], Récollet and parish priest of Trois-Rivières, presided at the celebration. He was accompanied by the parish priest of Champlain, François-Ignace Levasseur, Denis-Joseph's brother, Father Joseph Aubry, Jesuit priest and a friend of Denis-Joseph, and the parish priest of Saint-François-du-Lac, Jean-Baptiste Dugas, a friend of the Couturier family. All the parents and friends of the new spouses who were present at the signing of the contract, participated in the celebration including the notary Hyacinthe-Olivier Pressé. Other relatives and friends and several parishioners of St. Francis attended the ceremony. One can presume that a memorable and great feast followed religious celebration.

THE GROWTH OF THE FAMILY

AND THEIR ASSETS (1739-1754)

Denis-Joseph and Charlotte's family grew quickly during the first fifteen years. As early as 1739, Charlotte gave birth to her first child, she called him Ignace, the name of François-Ignace, Denis-Joseph's brother, and parish priest of Champlain. He was also the godfather, to represent the Levasseur, and Gertrude Maugras, Charlotte's mother, was chosen as godmother. The baptism register notes the presence of Noël Levasseur: obviously it is Pierre-Noël, the sculptor, Denis-Joseph's half-brother. Pierre-Noël

was able to go to Trois-Rivières, because, a rare occurrence at the time, six days passed between the birth and baptism of Ignace.

In 1741, Charlotte had a second child, which she named Joseph. In 1742, Marie-Charlotte was born. In 1744, a third son, Jean-Baptiste joined the family. In 1746, a second daughter, Catherine Françoise was born. Then, in 1747, a fourth boy, François dit Vigoureux was born. A little more than four years later, in 1751, Charlotte had another boy, to who she also gave the name of François. Why two François after a Françoise? It is difficult to comprehend, even if Charlotte was born in Saint-François-du-Lac and that she loved the Récollets, who were disciples of Saint-François. Ten days later, however, the young François died: it was the second mourning in Charlotte and Denis-Joseph's family, since five years ago, Catherine Françoise had lived only one month and a half. Their family was not vet complete. Two other children: Marie, in 1753, and Pierre, in Decembre1754. Charlotte was then 44 years old and Denis-Joseph, was 42..

Mid 18e century, Denis-Joseph and Charlotte had a family of seven children, full of energy and full of hope. Their life was relatively easy until then. Nobody could foresee the difficulties that they would have to overcome in the following years.

The family residence

When Denis-Joseph arrived at Trois-Rivières in 1736, the city was expanding mainly along the St. Lawrence River, outside the stockade and called by the notaries, Lower Town. In January 1715, René Godefroy, Lord of Tonnancour, conceded the last locations around the Commune: that of Antoine Bouton and Jean Truilly dit Lacombe. Ten years later, the habitants of Trois-Rivières, owners of the Commune, had agreed to grant sites in the town, always along the river. It is in LowerTtown that Denis-Joseph established his residence:

• the first one, in 1737, in the Commune, on a side street perpendicular to the River, between the current Notre-Dame-Centre and Du Fleuve streets. During the survey of the site in 1742 the surveyor, Jean-Baptiste Leclair, referred to the street as "Saint-Joseph street". It corresponds roughly to the current 'de la Fosse street'.

• and the other two, in 1741 and 1742, on the road that would become Du Fleuve street,

close to the Comunne. The following table summarizes the progression of these acquisitions:

After a little more than three years (1738-1741) in the Commune, it seems that Denis-Joseph wanted to be closer to the river and the business center. Why would he have bought, within a two year period (July 13, 1741 and December 14, 1742), two locations so close to one another? It is possible that after buying the second location, at the corner of the current Du Fleuve and Saint-Georges streets, Denis-Joseph has seized the opportunity to buy a third location that better suited his taste, at the corner of the current Du Fleuve and Raymond-Lasnier streets. And it is also possible that Denis-Joseph chose one of the two locations to build his work shop and store building materials. What is certain is that the third location became the home for all the following years. When Denis-Joseph and his wife Charlotte sold this third location to Ignace, their eldest son, in 1789, it was certainly their main residence. The Jean-Baptiste Badeaux notarial deed refers to a house, a barn, a stable and a stable for horses. That land quickly was the largest parcel of the three. The following map shows Denis-Joseph 'second and third residences.

CONCLUSION

Denis-Joseph's first twenty years in Trois-Rivières were happy and prosperous. The family was growing normally. Denis-Joseph became a renowned building contractor, even outside of Trois-Rivières. Having two houses near the port, Charlotte, his wife, thought of opening an inn. However more difficult times lay ahead following the war of conquest, the defeat on the Plains of Abraham, the British military occupation, the difficult beginnings of the English regime, and then the American invasion of 1775-1776. But the Levasseur family learned to deal with adversity: they continued to make plans, some of the children married and settled, in Bécancour, and the other in Trois-Rivières and in the suburbs. Denis-Joseph died, October 14, 1792, and Charlotte, October 11, 1797, at the end of a busy life. Their descendants would spread throughout the region, and in many locations in Canada and in the United States.

• 1737-1741: First residence of Denis-Joseph, in the Lower Town, the territory of the Commune, on a street perpendicular to the (probably the current de la Fosse).

• 1741 - 1753 (?): Second residence of Denis-Joseph, in Lower Town, near the comunne:

- bounded to the southwest at the beginning of the Comunne: today, by the Saint-Georges Street.

- bounded on the southeast by the road that will become the current Du Fleuve street.

[The quadrilateral where the 2e residence is located, was under the governance the Lord of Tonnancour]

- 1753 (?)-1789: Denis-Joseph's third residence in the Lower Town:
- bounded to the southwest by the current rue Raymond Lasnier;
- bounded on the southeast by the current rue Du Fleuve.

[The quadrilateral where the 3e residence is located was under the governance the Lord of Bécancour]


