In 1850, Lawrence Levasseur decided to move farther south of Quebec towards the town of Ausable, located in Clinton County, USA. The latter is a son of **Benjamin Levasseur** and Louise Carpentier, and a descendant of **Laurent Levasseur**. Formed in 1839, the town of AuSable takes its name from the AuSable River, which means "sand". At that time, the boom of the iron production was in full swing. Nestled within the city limits, the village of Keeseville benefited from the general prosperity of the region.

Those who cultivated the land thrived by supplying families who supported the iron industry. Transport facilities were implemented to allow the shipping of iron ore and goods to Lake Champlain. Rail centres developed. As people came to work in the mines in the region, the villages expanded and the needs for services in education and religion led to the construction of schools and churches.



That may not have been the original intent, as several of the borders between Canada and the United States were under dispute and constantly shifting at the time of my ancestor's movement, but nonetheless they ended up in the United States and started branching further out. I hope to help clarify the branching of three separate LeVasseur descendant lines as the migrated into the United States at the end of the 19th century. »


Lawrence LeVasseur, born in Saint-Basile-le-Grand, Madawaska, New Brunswick, Canada, on June 16, 1833, is the son of Benjamin LeVasseur and Louise Carpentier, descendant of Laurent Levasseur. He decided to move further south out of Quebec into the town of Ausable, New-York. In 1850 census, Lawrence is recorded as living in the house of Hiram Allen and Mary Allen, and their two children. Lawrence's occupation is « sawyer » witch means he worked at a sawmill, cutting lumber. Lawrence is also recorded as being a carpenter in later census records.


**Photo:** Alfred Vassar was granted land in Wisconsin and he wasted no time packing up his wife, his mother in law, and her children. and they all left, destined for Florence, Wisconsin. The Vassar boys built their home - Alfred built a cabin - and they began life in Wisconsin. The winters were harsh, but it was not anything they were not used to in New-York mountains.

#### The LeVasseur and the Hanmer

Of note, in the 1850 census, Lawrence was living next door to a John Hammer, who would have been the son on Alanson Hammer and Abigail Taylor, his future daughter in law Orilla's great uncle. The Vassars and the Hammers of Black Brook, New-York, are quite interconnected. Martha Hammer, married to Lawrence and Jane's Charles, and Orilla Hammer, married to Charles' brother Alfred, were sisters. Orissa Hammer, married to Lawrence and Jane's Henry, is a second cousin to Orilla and Martha.

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#### Lawrence LeVasseur and Jane Gladu marriage

In 1852, Lawrence married another french-canadian immigrant, Geneviève, later known as « Jane ». Her surname is fairly for debate at this point, due to the record being inconsistant. Their marriage record states Jane was known as « Clodgo », but we will refer to her from here on out as Jane Gladu. Jane's father was Pierre Gladu dit Sanschagrin, 1808-1886, and her mother Genevieve Stebenne 1812-1887. They had both moved to the Ausable area by 1860. Pierre is logged in the 1860 census as « Peter Gladu », Genevieve is logged as « Jane Gladu ».


## Lawrence and Jane had nine children. They are as follows:

- 1. Harriet Elizabeth Vasseur (Vassar) was born on November 11, 1855 in Keeseville, Essex, New York, USA. She died on Mar 1, 1940 in Ausable Forks, New York. She married Arthur Sheffield on October 31, 1885 in Saint Matthew Church, Black Brook, NY. He was born in 1853 in New York State.
- Alfred David Vassar, Sr. was born on Apr 10, 1858 in Black Brook, Clinton, New York, USA. He died on May 12, 1934 in New York, USA. He married Orilla Harriet Hanmer in 1875 in Black Brook, Clinton, New York, USA. She was born on Sep 4, 1857 in Au Sable, Clinton, New York, USA. She died on Sep 28, 1932 in Florence County, Wisconsin, USA.
- 3. Charles Vasseur (Vassar) was born on March 25,1862 in Keeseville, Clinton, New York, United States. He died on Apr 2, 1944 in Iron River, Iron, Michigan, United States. He married, Martha Jane Hanmer (daughter of Norman H. Hanmer and Izah Warren Cross, sister to Orilla, above) about 1883 in Florence, Wisconsin, USA. She was born on Mar 31, 1869 in Black Brook, Clinton, New York, United States. She died on 9 Jun 1948 in Iron River, Iron County, Michigan, United States.
- 4. Jesse Isidore Vasseur (Vassar) was born on Oct 28, 1864 in Keeseville, Essex, New York, United States. He died on Apr 14, 1947. He married Eleonora "Ellen" Sawyer in 1888. She was born on Jun 26,1870 in Keeseville, Clinton, New York, USA. She died in 1926 in Wisconsin, USA.
- 5. William Walter Vasseur was born on Feb 25, 1867 and baptized as "Benedictus Vasseur", on May 25, 1868 in St. John the Baptist, Keeseville, NY, USA. He died on Sep 8, 1951 in Lake Placid, Essex, New York, USA. He married Julia Fortune. She was born on Apr 4, 1869 in New York. She died on 21 May 1935 in Bloomingdale, Essex County, New York, USA.
- Antoine Antwine Vassar was born on Aug 29, 1869 in Keeseville, Essex, New York, USA. He died on Aug 18, 1954 in Au Sable, Clinton, New York, USA. He married Exilda Lefebvre in 1890. She was born in Oct 1870 in New York.
- 7. **Margaret E Vasseur** (Vassar) was born on May 3, 1871 in Black Brook, Clinton, New York, United States. She died in 1960 in Lake Placid, Essex, New York, USA. She married George Watson. He was born in 1873. He died in 1962. She married Lewis Sawyer in 1889. He was born in Oct 1867 in New York.
- 8. Henry Vasseur (Vassar) was born on Apr 15, 1873 in Black Brook, Clinton, New York, United States. He died on Oct 31, 1926 in Lake Placid, Essex, New York, USA. He married Orissa A Hanmer (daughter of Truman Thomas Hamner and Susan Elizabeth Winch) in 1901. She was born in Feb 1884 in New York, United States. She died in 1937 in Lake Placid, Essex, NY.
- George H Vassar was born on September 12, 1877 in Ausable Forks, New York. He died on 11 Mar 1910. He married Jennie Dowling on Oct 24,1899 in Nashua, New Hampshire. She was born in May 1879 in Nashua, Hillsborough, New Hampshire, USA.

The children's mother, Jane, died in 1892. She was interred in St. John's Cemetery in Keeseville, NY. Lawrence, aging, went to live with his son William and daughter in law Julia until he passed away in 1917, at the age of 84. Three of his children were gone from the area to Florence, Wisconsin by 1910: Alfred, Charles, and Jesse, along with their wives and children.



Orilla Harriet Hanmer was born September 4, 1857, to Norman H. Hanmer and Izah Warren Cross. Norman Hanmer was enlisted in the 12th NY, Company G, out of Plattsburgh, New York. Orilla was the third of thirteen children born to Norman and Izah, who had the following children in total:

#### The Hanmer's history

Norman Hanmer, and Truman Hanmer, descendants of Joseph Hanmer and Matilda Hamilton, are descendants of John Hanmer of Scituate, a colonist settler of the United States who immigrated in 1635 from England with the Winthrop Fleet. By June 1, 1658, John was admitted a freeman of the Plymouth Colony. John was a deacon in the church at Scituate, whose home was next to a man named Isaac Robinson. On June 3, 1662, John Hanmore (as his name was often adapted) is recorded in a list of twenty four men "that were servants and others that are ancient freeman" to be granted a parcel of land purchased from the Native Americans. John also had a large lot of land in the part of Scituate that is now Hanover. This was sold by his sons before 1690, and was dubbed "Hanmer's Hook".

Norman and Truman Hanmer are also descendants of Rowland Taylor, 1510-1555, who was martyred during the Marian Persecutions in England. At the time of his death, Rowland was a rector in Hadleigh, Suffolk, England. His great-grandson, William Taylor, immigrated to Virginia in 1637. Norman's father descends from this line as well. Norman and Truman both served in the American Civil War, fighting for the Union, and their grandfather (and great-grandfather, for Truman) Alanson Hanmer, served in the War of 1812 with the New York Militia.

Norman Hanmer, aged 67 years, a veteran of the divil war, died in the hospital at Plattaburgh Barracks yesterday morning.

On the night of Decemberr 8th he called at the guard house at the Post and asked to be kept over night saying he was sick from exposure. He was taken by a mamber of the guard to the homital where a G. A. R. badge was found upon his coat. and from papers in his pomonsion it was learned that he had been a member of the 12th United States Infantry. He was given every attention and care by the hospital officers and corps from the time he was given into their marge until death came, and too much credit cannot be arven for the kindness shown the soldier of long ago, and in notifying the local G. A. R. Post of his death.

His funeral will the held from the hospital at one o'clock this afternoon, and all members of Walter H. Benedict Post who can do so are requested to be present.

Hanmer was for a number of years a well-known character in the south part of this county. He was for many years caretaker of the large timber tracts of the J & J. Rogers Co., and lived almost a hermit's life in the woods, spenning his time in hunting and fishing and watching the timber lands of the Rogers Company.

Please note: Both descendants of Alfred David Vassar & Orilla Harriet Hanmer are also descendants of the Cornish Stephens family, whereas the other two DNA ethnicity profiles are not.

#### **DNA** Test

With the advancements of technology in recent years, we can take a DNA test and see our ethnicity breakdowns that we have inherited from our ancestors. Shown here are four Hanmer, three Hanmer-Vassar descendants. One can compare and contrast all four in variation to see what our ancestors were made up of. It is important to note that following DNA ethnicity results requires one to be quite familiar with the history of the populations and cultures in the world. For instance, someone from Mexico, whose ancestors were born and raised in Mexico, may expect to see some Iberian Penninsula DNA in their results due to the Spanish explorations.

One of the largest components to this genetic makeup that we see for all four candidates is something called "North Sea". This generally encompasses England, Scotland, some Sweden and Norway. The next largest, Atlantic, encompasses much of France, where the LeVasseurs immigrated from, as well as England, where the Hanmers are from. It bears well to keep in mind that with this genetic makeup, there have been brick walls and ends to paper trails on certain ancestors, and this genetic percentage dissection shown here should be taken with a grain of salt, especially in the case of the Amerindian percentage, which only hosts five Amerindian reference populations, both from North and Central America. This DNA analysis kit is the Eurogenes K15 on a website called Gedmatch. At this time, it appears to be the best kit for analysis of ethnicity of the Vassar/Hanmer genes. One must also note that the first male Vassar shown and the first female Vassar shown are also descendants of two sisters from the Stephens family, immigrants to America from Cornwall, England in the late 1860's.

The descendant names of this particular migratory branch of the Vassar family include Hanmer, Sawyer, Phaneuf, Valentine, Borden, Brown, Johnson, Sheffield, Wilkins, Whaley, Stockton, Milliron, Johnson, Anderson, and Peterson. 

### A bit of history: Ausable - Town History and Background

When Samuel de Champlain and his men paddled down the great lake from Quebec in 1609 the area was magnificent. Fish and game, black flies and mosquitoes were plentiful. For many years, claim to this land was contested between the Mohawk members of the Iroquois Confederacy and the Algonquians. On his exploration trip, Champlain encountered and fought with the Iroquois who then became fierce enemies of the French invaders. The Iroquois eventually allied with the English and the area surrounding Lake Champlain became a bloody battleground in the French and Indian War. In the Treaty of Paris of 1763, the French surrendered their North American possessions to the British. And, the Iroquois claims to the land between the St. Lawrence River and Lake Champlain were finally recognized.

Accomplishment. The long-distance swimmer, Heidi Levasseur, will return to Rimouski next Monday to prepare for her swim across the Atlantic.

Ms. Levasseur will hold a benefit evening of the type "server for a night" at the Crêpe Chignon restaurant, located in front of the Cathedral. "It will be a friendly gathering with ads about the development of her project to swim across the Atlantic. There will be exchanges, videos, promotional items as well as a presentation of the new jewelry collection "Creations to Cath". A lot of information will be distributed and there will be surprises!, explains, Ms. Levasseur.

She needs about \$500,000 to finance her expedition. In addition to the financial and athletic, aspects of this project, the scientific aspect creates much interest that includes a health research project by a researcher from the University of Sherbrooke. An agreement with the Research Center on Rimouski marine biotechnology (MBRC) remains to be clarified. Ms. Levasseur at the age, 36, has a Bachelor's degree in Biochemistry and another in psychology.

Since her passage in Rimouski in 2011, where she swam on the Saint Lawrence River from Trois-Rivières, Heidi Levasseur has developed affinities with navigators and scientists of the Rimouski region.

"I will leave from Cap-Vert, an island off the coast of Senegal, to Martinique. It will be a 1500 nautical mile swim across the Atlantic lasting 60 days, swimming eight hours a day, with a day off every four days. My goal is to start in December 2017," mentions Ms. Levasseur, also a friend of the sculptor Roger Langevin, who dedicated a work to her.
