Demographic evolution of the Levasseurs in the 1931 Canadian Census

The 1931 census is now indexed and available on the Government of Canada website⁽¹⁾. Here are some of the statistical data concerning the Levasseurs in the year 1931.

Important note: although relatively reliable, censuses, and notably the 1931 census, are still based on procedures dating back to the last century. Their reliability obviously depended on the enumerators themselves, their skill and the clarity of their handwriting. All the census sheets were on paper, but they have now been digitized, making them sometimes difficult to read. 


relationships, their language and their living environment (in extended families, immigrant communities, institutions or rooming houses, for example).


The publication of the 1931 census is twofold. The first part involves publishing today of the 234,687 digitized images of the census, accompanied by an interface enabling them to be browsed by district and sub-district. The second part is to transcribe the entire census, providing an intuitive, user-friendly search experience. By autumn 2023, everybody regardless of their level of genealogical or research expertise - will be able to search by name or place, thanks to the Census Search tool. To accomplish this colossal task in record time, Library and Archives Canada has forged partnerships with Ancestry® and FamilySearch International. »


